# **Flowers** come together

rectly in the cold.

As temperatures rose this weekend, the artist went to work. With help from Ron Harding, Chamber of Commerce executive director and treasurer of Sunflowers USA, he had most of the fiberglass work done by Sunday afternoon.

Harding, who let Cross stay in a rental behind his home, described the nearly finished painting as "awesome" and "overwhelming."

"As it grew," he said, "it just became more and more spectacular everyday." Harding said he liked how Cross used fiberglass mounds to create texture and give the painting a three-dimensional appearance. He hasn't been the only one keeping his eye on progress.

Many of the state's larger newspapers have followed the project for a year, reporting on the artist's vision, his problems securing a work visa and the two-month painting process. Curiosity lured people from Goodland, along with those from other cities and state, to the fairgrounds. Cross said he had visitors every day.

Ray and Irma Chubbuck of Goodland drove up while Cross and Harding were working this weekend. They took a ride in the cherry picker bucket the artist uses to view his work from above and oohed and aahed over the colorful creation

"I think it's gorgeous," said Mrs. Chubbuck. "I'm excited about seeing it up.'

But will it fit into this farming community?

"A lot of people here are interested in art and history," she said. "Besides, this is the Sunflower Capital.'

As for Cross, he says it's his best work vet.

"I think it turned out fantastic," he said, noting that he spent 50 more hours reproducing this painting than others he's finished.

Cross said the painting — a replica of the first in Van Gogh's series — is

"The other paintings are basically just variations of yellow," he said. This one is unique unto itself."

Cross is confident in his work now, but he said the feeling comes and goes. Some nights, he said, he remembers that he is thousands of miles from family and friends, doesn't have a job or taught for 8 1/2 years and right now, regular income and doesn't have another gig lined up yet.

Cross said he's still in contract negotiations with a group that wants one of his paintings in South Africa and the sunflower series is finished. plans to make a presentation in Amsterdam, but nothing is sure.

Even in Goodland, where the project is nearly complete, the city commission this week put off approving a lease on land at the painting site, with members saying they didn't want the city to become responsible for maintenance.

"I'm a little puzzled about why it's not being received with open arms,' she said.

"Ah, there are moments," he said, "but what can you do?"

Right now, Cross, who has a girlfriend but is unmarried and childless, says, nothing is holding him back. He can go where he wants, do what he wants.
