Pratt school board adopts biology revision

science standards for teaching high school biology, a version written with the aid of people who support the theory of intelligent design, was adopted Monday night by the Pratt School Board.

The action came on a 4-2 vote, with the votes in favor coming from four board members who submitted the new version that made additions to a draft submitted earlier by the high school science faculty.

That version, written by three teachers, was rejected on a 4-3 vote in June. Teachers were then asked to revise
