Winter can be a difficult time for strawberries in Kansas. Mulching helps protect strawberry plants not only from low temperatures but

also from heaving damage. Heaving damage is a result of the alternate freezing and thawing common in Kansas winters that lifts plants out of the ground where they may die. Strawberries are normally mulched for the winter around Thanksgiving.

Wheat straw makes a good mulch and is widely available. The straw should be spread over the plants to a depth of three mulch left in the aisles helps protect pickinches. Be sure to shake straw apart so ers from muddy conditions.
