Travel council helps bring tourists to town

GOODLAND - The Northwest Kansas Travel Council was established to attract additional travelers to visit more communities and attractions in northwest Kansas.

The council is a non-profit organization, which was formed to serve, support and promote tourism.

Sixteen counties in the northwest corner of Kansas, from the Colorado border to Russell County and the Nebraska Border to I-70 with the inclusion of Wallace and Logan Counties, are members of the council.

The council members provide local leadership opportunities for developing and carrying out a plan for the orderly and effective promotion of tourism and recreation.

One of the most reliable indicators of tourism is the transient guest tax that is collected by local motels from visitors and given back to the community.

In the last two years the actual lodging sales in Kansas increased by over \$1 million. It is estimated by the state, that upon the average, a traveler spends an additional \$60 for every \$40 spent on lodging. These are direct dollars that are spent in our communities.

It is estimated the total impact from tourism dollars for the northwest region of Kansas was \$50,243,682 for 1998 and \$52,827,598 for 1999.

Sherman County had an estimated \$7,058,887 in tourism dollars for 1998. this was from overnight travelers only. For 1999 it is estimated \$7,155,960 was brought in from overnight travelers, an increase of nearly \$100,000 in one year's time.

The Northwest Travel Council works to increase these numbers by promotional materials that are distributed at travel shows each year in Kansas City and Denver.
