Despite an injury and difficulties in the final matches, Goodland's wrestling coach said the Cowboys had a successful first tournament of the season, coming in second behind Scott City.

The Beavers grabbed first place, having racked up 177 1/2 team points in Saturday's nine-team invitational tournament at the St. Francis high school. Goodland wrestlers came close with 166 1/2 team points.

Bryce Abbey was recognized for his skills, earning the title of "outstanding wrestler" after the senior took down Barrett Duell, Burlington's star wrestler, for the first-place medal.

Earlier in the week, Coach Chris Guillot said because the Cowboys would be facing teams of similar size and strength, the tournament would act as a measuring stick for the season. Afterwards, Guillot said the team — comprising mainly stacked up well.

"We had eight advance to the finals match," he said, "but we didn't win all of the matches."

The Cowboys triumphed in three of the eight matches, but the coach said every wrestler gave it his all.

"They wrestled aggressively and worked hard," Guillot said. "They made young mistakes, but showed heart.'
