The seventh grade team now boast a perfect 8-0 record for the season with only one more regular home game before the league tournament.

In the eighth grade game, leading scorers were David Livengood with 15, Wade Taylor with 10 and Derrick Raymer with eight.

Leaders for rebounds were Taylor with six and Livengood with four. Livengood also managed six steals and Lane Winter had two.

Leading in assists was Drew Wilkens with two. He also scored six points.

In the seventh grade game, the score at halftime was 20-11 in Goodland's favor.

"A tight man-to-man defense held the Indians to just two points in the second half," said coach Wallace Hansen.

Leading the way for Goodland scoring were Bobby Miller with 14, Wyatt Dautel with 10, Jace Herl with nine and Jon Beeson with six. Miller and Beeson both pulled in five rebounds to lead in that department.

Miller had four steals leading to three baskets. Herl lead the assists with four, while Beeson and Brandon Zelfer had two apiece.

"Goodland forced the Indians into 19 turnovers while keeping their own to only nine," said the coach.

In the fifth quarter after the games, the Mustangs scored six points, two each by Matt Rohr, Brett Lalicker and Kalen Lambrecht. St. Francis had eight.

The next action for the Mustangs will be at home on Tuesday against Burlington. On Thursday, Goodland will be in Oberlin for the Northwest Kansas League tournament and should get the No. 1 seed.

Kansas suffers 31-point loss

Players dread facing coach in next practice

WINSTON-SALEM, N.C. (AP)-The Kansas players don't know what's worse — a 31-point loss to No. 11 Wake Forest or spending the next few days in practice with an angry Roy Williams.

"I've had one of those practices before," Drew Gooden said following an 84-53 loss Thursday night to the undefeated Demon Deacons. "Whatever it takes for us to get better. We just have to go out there and show that we're tough."

Wake Forest (7-0) got a career-high 21 points from Josh Howard, and Craig Dawson added 20 as Wake Forest beat No. 3 Kansas.

The Jayhawks were without leading scorer Kenny Gregory, who didn't play because of a stress fracture in his right foot.

"What you saw was an excellent basketball team that was well off their game," Wake Forest coach Dave Odom said of the highly ranked Jayhawks. "Did we have something to do with that? I would like to think so.

"Nobody needs to feel sorry for Kansas," Odom added. "Roy Williams is as good a coach as there is in the game today.

"He'll take his team home and whip them where they need to be whipped and coddle them where they need to be coddled. They'll come out of the chutes

blazing again."

That wasn't the case Thursday night as one of the nation's best offenses looked lost without its star, matching the fourth-worst loss in school history and second-worst under Williams. "They kicked our tails every which

way it can be kicked," Williams said.

points and shooting 55.4 percent third-best in the nation — but couldn't get its offense clicking without its senior leader in its first road game.

Gregory was off to a great year, averaging 17.9 points and 7.7 rebounds, but missed his first start of the season.

"I think that is using an excuse," Williams said. "We've had guys be out before and we talked about it in the locker room. When an important guy is out everybody has to elevate their play a little bit. We did not do that.

"Kenny Gregory was not the story of this game, it was Wake Forest kicking Kansas and kicking us as badly as it can be done."

The Demon Deacons, shooting 68 percent in the second half, won their 12th straight dating to last season and are off to their best start since Tim Duncan's senior season of 1996-97.

"We felt that we could beat them," Robert O'Kelley said. "But it's important for us not to be a big head."

The Jayhawks failed to start 8-0 under Williams for the fifth time in his 13 seasons, shooting a season-low 38 percent and turning it over 20 times without Gregory in the lineup.
