Selby said all other participants are said that and the time difference hooked up by S&T Telephone, based in Brewster, and that telephone company charges the Goodland district \$400 a month to be involved.

Karla Murray, the district's technology coordinator, told board members that Southwestern Bell will no longer provide the service when the contract ends.

She said the district can continue the program by switching to S&T, which is planning to upgrade the network that connects schools from analog to digital.

The upgrade, she said, will cost more than \$36,000 but will allow students here to take classes from schools in southeastern Kansas. Now students are confined to taking classes taught at the 14 participating schools.

Superintendent Selby outlined the pros and cons of continuing the program and signing on with S&T.

He said the district has rarely used the program in the past because of conflicting class schedules and time difference, but could find it more useful with access to larger schools in the south-

Goodland High students, Selby said, class schedules differ from day to day - that many schools don't have. He

(Goodland is an hour behind in the Mountain Time Zone) make it hard to teach or take classes with other schools.

Selby the district wants students to take classes not taught in Goodland, such as French, but no one in the program offers those classes.

Three people from St. Francis, he said, use the equipment to tune into a course at Fort Hays State University and a woman from Goodland teaches Spanish to students outside Sherman County.

Besides that, Selby said, no one from Goodland benefits from the program.

He said the program could be good if the district can tap into a larger school with diverse classes, but the time and class conflicts could still get in the way. Selby added that the program may never be used enough to warrant spending more than \$20,000 a year on it.
