the two new troopers, he said, after a review by Col. Don Brownlee, superintendent of the patrol.

Troopers are informed of their assignment before they start the academy, Eichkorn said, so that they have the opportunity to decided if this is where they want to go before they start training. Both of the new recruits are western Kansas natives.

Albers graduated from Colby High School and attended Colby Community College, where he received an associate degree in computer science.

Vrbas graduated from Atwood High School and attended Kansas State University, where he received a Bachelor of Science degree in natural resources management.

Vrbas had been a deputy for the Routt County Sheriff's Department in Steamboat Springs, Colo.
