Leaves not fallen in eastern Kansas

Traveling across Kansas this year you may have seen many trees that have not lost their leaves. In our area we see scat-

tered trees still holding on to their leaves, but not like east of us.

Wind action, for us, removes most of even the strongly attached leaves here. Across the state the trees holding onto their leaves, have experienced a "marcescent" autumn. Marcescent means "to wither without falling off." A new term for me, but it is something I have wondered about while traveling.

A tree usually prepares for winter by breaking down the chlorophyll in the leaves, reabsorbing nitrogen and other nutrients, and developing an abscission layer at the base of the petiole. The reabsorbing process is important to conserve nutrients, while the abscission layer (a layer of cells with weakened cell walls) allows the leaf to detach easily. A tree without leaves is much less likely to damage from ice glazing or a heavy, wet snow.

The early freeze killed the stillgreen leaves on the tree, thus interrupting the normal acclimation process. If we experience an ice storm or wet snowfall early this winter before the leaves have fallen, there could be significant branch breakage on those trees. Some oaks, like the pin oak seen in the Kansas City area, often hold their leaves most of the winter. However, unusual breakage is not seen in this species, due to the strength of its wood, and the rightangle branching pattern of most pin

oaks. There is really no treatment for the marcescent condition. Unfortunately trees that are shocked into winter sometimes have stress the next year after leafing out. We have seen several examples of this in the past, one notable example was the early freeze suffer branch breakage and other a few years ago that got so many of our elms. We are still seeing the affects of that winter.
