# Lifeskills program helps teach students

pieces of it in their classrooms.

Distribution of the Lifeskills posters began in April 1999, Porterfield said. Last year, it was done by a church youth group.

This year, Jon McLean's freshman study skills class is distributing the posters to businesses on Main Street as a community service project, going downtown from 8 to 9 a.m. the first week of each month. The words are posted in about 45-50 businesses each month.

The posters are also put up in all Goodland school buildings and some teachers have made special bulletin boards focusing on the skills.

At schools that have electronic message boards, the lifeskills word is put on them.

Some of the fifth grade teachers at North School emphasize life skills all year long. They have a "lifelong guideline" pledge that they have students recite each morning after the Pledge of Allegiance.

It says, "I will be truthful, trustworthy and an active listener, too. I will do my personal best and give no put downs to you."

Porterfield said some teachers use Lifeskills words as a theme topic for papers or they may ask what skills are demonstrated in certain situations.

The idea is to try to keep the lifeskills in the minds of the students.

"The grade schools are using it more on a regular basis than at the high school," Porterfield said.

The Lifeskills words are written in English and Spanish on the posters as a way to include Hispanic students and parents in the program. Porterfield said there is one Hispanic member of he committee.
