City reduces Wal-Mart's trash fee

The Goodland Daily News The Goodland City Commission voted Thursday to reduce the fee it charges a contractor to pick up Wal-Mart's trash from \$450 a month to \$300 a month, but commissioners said the city couldn't afford to drop it entirely.

Commission members voted in a noon meeting called so the contract the city has with trash contractor Kevin Butts could be renewed before it expired on the first of the year. They renewed the contract with Butts and lowered the city's fee for Butts picking up trash to \$300 a month.

Wal-Mart Manager Scott Schroller had asked the commission, when it was about to renew the contract with Butts at the last commission meeting on Dec. 18, to reduce or eliminate the fee.

At that meeting, Schroller said he didn't have a written contract with Butts and might consider changing to a different service or having the city haul the trash if that would save money.

The commission set the special meeting so they could reword the contract with Butts. Under the old pact, the city could still require a payment from

Butts whether he was still hauling the trash for seems to work really well for everyone. Wal-Mart or not.

Both Butts and Schroller were present at the special meeting.

"I still think that \$300 is outrageous," said Butts. 'The city isn't even doing anything.'

Both Schroller and Butts said they had hoped to get the cost reduced by half. Commissioners said they couldn't reduce it that much because they already had the fee budgeted for this year.

"I think we should all try to work together," said Commissioner Rick Billinger. "This system

If Butts refused to pickup the trash at Wal-Mart, the city would have to do it, said City Manager Ron Pickman.

Pickman had worked up a cost estimate for the city would which would have to charge \$18,576 per year with \$78 for each additional trip they had to make to pick up the trash outside of their regular schedule.

The Goodland Daily News With New Year's Eve falling on a Sunday this year, liquor stores in Goodland are hoping that people will plan ahead for the holiday.

With its heritage as a longtime "dry" state, Kansas still forbids liquor and beer sales on Sundays - even if it is New Year's Eve. Store owners across the state are worried that will cut into what usually is a bonanza.

"I don't think that I am worried about the sales," said Larry Jackson, owner of Reb's Party and Mix Shop. "I think people will know enough to plan ahead.'

The owner of Kamper Liquor said he was concerned about the sales for the holiday, which has a reputation for being one of the busiest days for liquor sales.

"I don't quite know what to expect," said Jack Kamper, the owner. "Most people buy the liquor for their celebrations on New Year's Eve."

He said he thought people would plan ahead for the holiday, but his main concern was if they didn't buy enough they would run out. Since Nebraska's liquor stores are allowed to be open on Sunday, he said he thinks people will go there if they run out.

"We made chocolate chip, butterscotch pecan and oatmeal raisin," Judy said. "We will also be making ginger snaps, sugar cookies and peanut butter with the cookie maker. Our coconut macaroons will continue to be made by hand, as the dough will not work in the machine."
