The Goodland Daily News It was a good year for Goodland sports teams, with a lot of seasons and several teams making it to state competition.

The Goodland High Cowboy wrestlers made the long journey to state this year, bringing back nine medals and the team trophy. The Brewster Bulldogs boys basketball team won the state title in Class 1A.

For the first time in many years, Goodland 14-and-under fast-pitch softball team, the Diamond Dusters, made the trip to the state tournament, and Cowgirl Jessica Osborn, on the girls golf team, also went to state.

Several Cowgirls and Cowboys on the track team made it to state with the girls taking ninth place and the boys taking 24th overall.

The Goodland High volleyball team and the Brewster football team got very close to the state finals, with both teams making it to sub-state before taking a fatal loss.

All nine of the Goodland wrestlers who competed in the state tournament in Wichita on the last weekend in February walked away with medals.

The Cowboys dominated the state championships, wrapping up the team trophy before the end of the consolation quarter finals. They won the team title with 142.5 points, well out in front of second place Santa Fe Trail at

Aaron Schields was the only Goodand wrestler to bring back the gold, winning the state championship at 152 pounds with a 11-6 decision over Kyle Robinson of Abilene.

Bryce Bahe and Joey Smith came back with silver medals as runners-up at 119 and 145 pounds. Bahe lost a 7-6 decision to Dustin Tovar of Abilene, who managed a last second escape for the winning point just as the match would have headed into overtime.

Smith lost a 6-3 decision to Wes Reynolds of El Dorado when he got reversed and gave up back points late in the third period. He had been leading 3-2.

Matt Schields won a 3-2 decision

Elsewhere in the Big 12 on the final weekend of the year, No. 7 Kansas routed Southwest Missouri State 77-43. Missouri beat Stetson 89-64, Baylor bounced Montana 77-57, No. 17 Oklahoma slipped past Southern Methodist 79-78 in overtime, Texas got by Utah 70-59, Colorado defeated Wisconsin-Milwaukee 74-71 in overtime, No. 25 Iowa State upended Western Carolina 91-53, Texas A&M got the best of Detroit 81-72, and Murray State, much to the disgust of Nebraska coach Barry Collier, beat the Huskers 79-71.

In a late-nighter, San Diego State beat Oklahoma State 87-66, one of Eddie Sutton's most lopsided losses in 11 years as Cowboys' coach.
