# Trimmed garments increase cleaning costs

Is there anything more beautiful than a dress or sweater that has been accented with a fine or delicate trim?

Sequins, beads, glitter, leather or even fur can take an average garment and add a hint of sophistication or a glimpse of glamour. Trim can also add frustration and increase the cost for cleaning the garment.

Due to the delicacy of some trims, special cleaning requirements may be required. Some garments may require the removal of the trim prior to cleaning, while others may eliminate dry cleaning altogether and ask that the garment be spot-cleaned. The proper cleaning procedure should be found within the care label attached to the garment.

Manufacturers are required to tag their clothing with at least one safe cleaning method. The care label should list possible warnings about any step within the dry cleaning process. The instructions on the care label should pertain to all permanently attached parts of the garment including the trim or a separate care label can be added

with care instructions for the trimmed portion of the garment. Unfortunately, not all manufacturers adhere to these guidelines.

Cleaning a delicately trimmed garment does not need to be a lost cause. Many cleaners have years of experience handling trimmed garments. The cleaner should inform you of the possible dangers of cleaning the garment according to the care label, have you sign a release form authorizing the cleaning, and then proceed as instructed by the label. Either the garment will be cleaned without a problem or the garment will be damaged in some way.

If the garment is damaged the Federal Trade Commission asks that the problem be handled in the following way. Return

the garment to the retailer and ask for an exchange or a refund. If the retailer will not cooperate, ask for the manufacturer’s name, number and address and write to the company.

In your letter, the commission recommends that you describe the garment and list information from labels and tags. Also include the full name and address of the store where the garment was purchased.

Following up on a damaged garment can be irritating and time consuming, but the result can make it worthwhile. In the past, manufacturers have replaced garments, reimbursed the cost of the garment and even done both, then recalled the product.

So, the next time you have a beautifully trimmed garment that needs cleaning, make sure the care label is present, have your cleaner advise you of possible trouble areas and remember the steps for reimbursement just in case the garment is damaged during the cleaning process.

The next meeting will be on Thursday, Jan. 18, at Arleta Musil’s home. *Loraine Fenner, public relations*

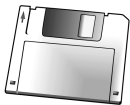
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
