few seconds earlier? What if he hadn't landed on the truck's windshield?

"It's just unbelievable," she said. "That so... well, like they said at the funeral, here's a man that wanted to commit suicide and he killed Lyn who was so full of life.'

The Baumans returned from Salina Tuesday night, and Kindi Bauman said she bought a pager so her sister can reach her anywhere. She said Traci is doing better than expected.

"She said she's got to be strong for the kids," Bauman said.

The couple was raising three children, Amanda, 16, Tanner, 11 and Tanzia, 2. Another of Lyn Gurtner's children from a previous marriage is

living in Ohio.

Bauman said Lyn was a family-oriented man who loved spending time with his wife and children.

"He worked for Schwan's," Bauman said, "so he wasn't home a lot, but Sunday night was family night. They kept to that like clock work."

Each morning before the kids got up, she said, Traci and Lyn would sit at their kitchen table and talk.

"That was their time," she said. "They had coffee together every morning. I noticed it was the hardest for her in the morning. I just think about how her routine will be changed."

She said Traci, who stayed home to raise the children, didn't express anger towards the man who officers say murdered her husband.

"She's not mad," she said. "She's just so sad, has just such an empty feeling. Truthfully, I don't know if she's had time to let it sink in."

People have asked, Bauman said, if Traci is going to sue the Salina Regional Health Center, which Burkhead, who had been in and out of psychiatric her thinking about making the most of wards, had escaped from the day before. She said it hasn't been discussed.

Burkhead had escaped from the hospital once before and had been found near a house in his hometown of Wilson carrying a bag filled with dead cats. The murder-suicide has prompted Kansas officials to question the state's ability to properly care for people with mental health problems.

Bauman said she hopes her brotherin-law never knew what hit him.

"You know how loud it is when a bird hits your windshield," she said "Imagine a huge man crashing through your windshield. We just hope because it was dark, Lyn never saw him and that it was over fast.'

The death, Bauman said, has gotten every moment. She said it comforts her to know Lyn enjoyed life to the fullest.

"He canoed, bungee jumped," she said. "He was a very outdoorsy guy."

His favorite poem, Bauman said, was "Last Chance," and reflects his belief in living each day as if it was your last.

A passage from the poem reads: "If I knew it would be the last time... I could spare an extra minute or two to stop and say, 'I love you,' instead of assuming you would know that I do."
