Student wins Voice of Democracy contest

Jason Showalter, a Goodland High School senior, won the Voice of Democracy speech contest Saturday at the Department of Kansas Veterans of Foreign Wars Mid-Winter conference.

The Voice of Democracy program is a national audio-essay competition designed to give high school students a chance to voice their opinion about their responsibility to the United States. The conference was held in Great Bend.

Besides winning \$650 and a jacket, Showalter will have his tape entered into the national level of competition and the Veterans of Foreign Wars will pay for him to spend a week in Washington, D.C. in April. He is also guaranteed a \$1,000 scholarship.

If Showalter places in the top 10 at nationals, he will be in the running for a \$4,000 to \$25,000 scholarship.

obituary

William Clarke Osborne

William Clarke Osborne, 103, Cheyenne Wells, Colo., a former Brewster resident, died Monday, Jan. 15, 2001, at the Veteran's State Nursing Home in Florence, Colo.

He was born April 30, 1897, at Harlan, Iowa, the son of Hannah Wilna (St. Clair) and William Penn Osborn. He was the fifth of six children.

He moved with his family from Danbury, Iowa, to La Junta, Colo., in 1905. He also lived in Clifton, Palisade and Cheraw, Colo., for a time.

He attended school through the seventh grade. Later, he studied electrical and mechanical engineering by correspondence.

In 1915, he moved to Brewster with his father and his brother, Ralph. From 1915 to 1918, they ran a carpentry shop and built a number of homes and barns in the area.

He enlisted in the U.S. Army on May 28, 1918, and performed electrical work in England and France during World War I. He was discharged on April 19, 1919.

He and Lourene O'Neal were married Dec. 24, 1921, in Brewster.

He maintained the electrical lines between Colby and Brewster when they were built in 1923 until 1939.

In 1943, the family moved to La Junta. Mr. Osborne taught electricity at the air base in La Junta during World

War II.

In 1953, the family moved to Cheyenne Wells where he built grain elevators, installed Fairbanks Morse scales and was the state electrical inspector.

He retired in 1976.

He was a member of the Methodist Church of Brewster, where he taught the high school Sunday School class for 17 years and led the choir. He later transferred his membership to Cheyenne Wells.

He was a charter member and past commander of the Brewster American Legion and a member of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, the International Order of Odd Fellows Lodge, and the Masonic Lodge, all in Cheyenne Wells.

He served on the city council in Cheyenne Wells for 16 years.

He was a volunteer at the Cheyenne Wells nursing home.

His funeral services were held today

at the Cheyenne Wells United Methodist Church with the Rev. Michael Ingersoll officiating. Burial was in the Fairview Cemetery at Cheyenne Wells with military rites.

Survivors include two sons, Elroy of Salina and Creighton of Hugo, Colo.; two daughters, Velda Jones of Colorado Springs and Dorothy Mayer of Mesa, Ariz.; a son-in-law, Vern Williams of Dewey, Ariz.; 19 grandchildren; 51 great-grandchildren; 14 great-great-grandchildren; and many nieces and nephews.

He was preceded in death by his wife in 1991; a daughter, Marna Williams; his parents; three sisters, Ferne Hartge, June Chittenden and Edith Heath; two brothers, Ward and Ralph Osborn; and two sons-in-law, Jerry Jones and Ray Mayer.

Funeral arrangements were handled by Hendricks-Love Mortuary of Burlington, Colo.

Morning and afternoon sessions are available. Carrie Starns, director of the program, said parents should sign up early because classes fill up quickly.

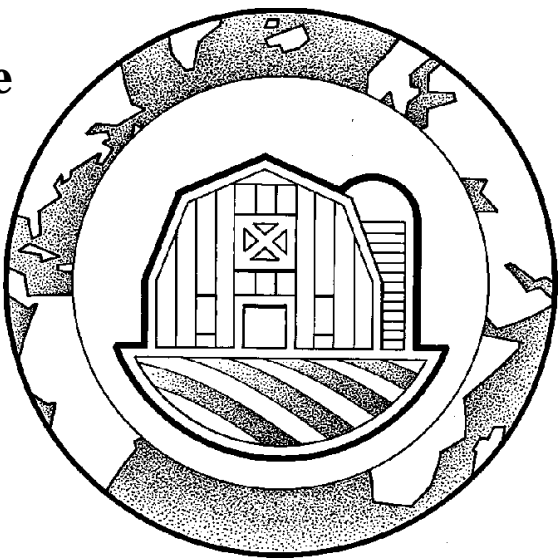
