Commissioners accept van

The Goodland Dailv News Sherman County Commissioners agreed Tuesday to accept a van from the state to be used in the Women, Infant and Children program, but tabled issues dealing with appointing member of the Convention and Visitors Bureau board and an agreement with the city to repair a rough stretch of old U.S. 24.

Dorendo Harrel, county health administrator, ask commissioners to accept a 1996 Ford van being offered by the state to be used in the Women, Infant and Children program. The van is to be given to Sherman County, which will be responsible for licensing and insurance.

Harrel said the van would become county property, and would be used to travel to the clinic sites for the Women, Infant and Children program in the seven counties in northwest Kansas which are handled by the Sherman County Health Department.

The commissioners unanimously agreed to accept the van.

Recommendations for appointment to the Sherman County Convention and Visitors Bureau board were tabled because there were not enough motel people being appointed as required in the bylaws.

The recommendation included only five motel representatives while the bylaws require six to be from motels.

The commissioners also decided to withhold money from the county "bed tax" on motel rooms until the proper board can be appointed. The board spends the money to promote tourism here.

County Attorney Bonnie Selby told the commissioners she had received a call from City Manager Ron Pickman asking that the agreement between the city and county cover the maintenance of all roads currently shared by the city and county.

The original agreement was drafted by Selby to allow the county to repair the city's portions of old U.S. 24. She said Pickman reported the city commission had some quessee a solid agreement which addresses the whole issue.
