WICHITA (AP) — Wichita State University's new senior fellow in low — an unpaid position, Sheffield American politics and public policy brings a wealth of real-world experience to the position.

He is outgoing Agriculture Secretary and former U.S. Rep. Dan Glickman, whose appointment at Wichita State took effect when he left his Cabinet post Saturday.

As senior fellow, Glickman will return to his hometown of Wichita periodically to participate in classes, seminars and other events, said Jim Sheffield, chairman of the university's political science department. Glickman's first visit is expected in mid- to late April.

Glickman served as a representative from Kansas' 4th District from 1977 to 1995 and as secretary of agriculture since then. His Cabinet job ended with Saturday's inauguration of President Bush.
