HUTCHINSON (AP) — The gas exmation provided by The Sherman plosions that hit Hutchinson earlier this month have claimed a second life.

Mary Ann Hahn, 64, died Monday morning of smoke inhalation and burns, said Sharon Hurley, house supervisor at Via Christi Regional Medical Center-St. Francis campus in Wichita.

Hahn and her husband. John Hahn, 68. were injured Jan. 18 when a gas geyser exploded near their home at the Big Chief Mobile Home Park. John Hahn died the next day from injuries suffered in the blast. Mrs. Hahn had been hospitalized since the explosion.

On Jan. 17, a natural gas leak from the Yaggy gas storage facility, seven miles northwest of town, slithered underground and erupted. The initial explosion destroyed two downtown businesses.

The next day, another blast leveled the mobile home where the Hahns had lived for the past three years, severely burning the couple, as gas leaks caused geysers to spew from blowholes around town.
