Entrepreneur offers alternative fuel

and zinc in a can. Add equal parts water and alcohol and let nature take its course.

It's a recipe for hydrogen production that a Great Bend entrepreneur says could give the nation a clean efficient alternative to fossil fuels.

Steve Thomas outlined his patented processes Tuesday for the Senate Utilities Committee, complete with a combustion demonstration.

Known as hydronics energy technologies, the process releases hydrogen from water and alcohol. The liquid reacts with electrons from a powder of metals, such as magnesium and zinc.

"This is a very, very efficient hydrogen producer," Thomas said as a 2-foot bright orange flame burned from a can on a table.

The demonstration came as legislators grapple with high natural gas prices. As an alternative to fossil fuels, hydrogen could provide a cleaner, cheaper source of power.

Thomas said hydrogen is a more efficient fuel, producing more than three times the British thermal units, or BTU,

TOPEKA — Put a little magnesium of natural gas. One pound of hydrogen creates 154,000 BTU, while an equal amount of coal creates 12,000 BTU.

> Hydrogen can be produced safely using hydronics on the back of a tractortrailer or a fixed tank at a plant, he said Run a pipe from the supply to turbines. with little modification of equipment.

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
