forward Dave Reid wanted to apologize to Patrick Roy for the Avalanche's less-than-stellar effort in front of their star goaltender Tuesday night.

"Jeez, Patty, in the second period, we just left you out there to die," Reid said to Roy as they dressed following Colorado's 3-1 win over the San Jose Sharks. "Here, stop that one, Patty. Here, get this one.'

Roy didn't seem to mind. He stopped 25 shots — including 12 in the second period — and Chris Drury scored the go-ahead goal as the Avalanche extended their unbeaten streak to 10

"I think (Roy) was awesome tonight," said Sharks goalie Evgeni Nabokov, who had several gems among his 19 saves but couldn't match Roy. "He was the key to the game because we outplayed them, but he was there for them."

In a showdown between Western Conference powers, the Avalanche won their seventh straight game with a mixed offensive effort but stellar goaltending against the Sharks, who were riding high from consecutive road wins over Dallas and St. Louis. Colorado shook off two mediocre periods to score twice in the third.

"I was kind of expecting that kind of start from our team because we hadn't played in a couple of days," Roy said. "Luckily, we finally found a way to score two goals. We all believe we could still play better."
