• Approved the certification of completion of the demolition grant, and authorized city officials to sign the final papers. Several commissioners commented that the grant had been good for the city and for the citizens who would not have been able to remove the old structures without help.

• Approved appointment of Darwin McClung and Cameron Paxton to three-year terms on the city building board of appeals.

• Approved daycare permit for Carlene Fenner, 217 W. 12th, with approval of her state license.

• Approved a permit to allow Annette Fairbanks to operate an abstracting business out of her home at 517 Main. Commissioner Hurd voted against the permit,

saying he feels businesses should be in the commercial area of the city.

• Approved an ordinance setting out the procedures for companies who dig up streets and alleys to refill and repair the holes. The new ordinance calls for the use of concrete on all except brick streets. Alleys are to be returned to the same condition as they were before the work was done.

• Approved repairs to the roof of the city building, and to prepare a proposal for later this year to put a new steel or standing seamed roof on the building to replace the current flat roof. It is estimated it will cost \$2,900 to patch the leaking roof.

The meeting adjourned at 5:40 p.m. The next regular commission meeting will be 5 p.m., Monday, March 5, in the commission room on the second floor of the City Administration Building at 204 W. 11th street.
