Coach reaches career milestone

LAWRENCE (AP) - Roy Will- win. iams, thanks in large part to Colorado, has reached a career milestone as Kansas coach.

Overcoming foul problems and near-perfect foul shooting by the Buffaloes, the 11th-ranked Jayhawks rang up a 91-79 victory Wednesday night. That gave Williams win No. 349, putting him No. 2 among Kansas coaches.

Twenty-nine of his wins have been at the expense of Colorado, which has only one victory against Kansas since Williams became coach in 1989.

"We have a lot of pride that we helped him accomplish that," said Jeff Carey, who came off the bench to score seven points and grab nine rebounds. "There's such a great relationship between coach and the players on this team. We feel great to be a part of his accomplishments."

Williams trails Phog Allen, a pioneer of college coaching, by 241 victories.

"Some day I will look back on it and feel really good," said Williams, whose career mark is 349-182. "I'll think about all the kids and how well they've represented us. On game night it put their lead at 52-36. doesn't seem all that important, be-
