Late driver's car wins

AUTO RACING ROCKINGHAM, N.C. — With tears in his eyes, Steve Park honored his late boss by driving a Dale Earnhardt car to victory in the Dura Lube 400.

Park held off Winston Cup champion Bobby Labonte by two car-lengths in the rain-delayed race at North Carolina Speedway.

It was a fitting end to a race that began with a frightening first-lap crash by Park's teammate, Dale Earnhardt Jr.

Three turns after the race started, a battered car and a hushed crowd provided a reminder of the previous week's tragedy in Daytona.

Earnhardt Jr. was tapped from behind and slammed into the wall between turns 3 and 4 at about 150 mph — just seven days after his father died in an eerily similar crash on the last lap of the Daytona 500.

BASKETBALL

OKLAHOMA CITY — Oklahoma has lost arguably its best basketball player with the dismissal of guard J.R. Raymond.

Raymond, a junior, was dismissed from the team Sunday for the rest of the season because of a policy violation coach Kelvin Sampson won't discuss. He had averaged 18 points in the previous 10 games, with 16thranked Oklahoma winning nine of them. No decision has been made on whether he will be allowed to play next season.

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. — Florida State linebacker Devaughn Darling died after collapsing following an offseason workout at the school.

The cause of death was not immediately determined, a university spokesman said. The 18-year-old player was working out with his twin brother, also a member of the team.

Darling, of Houston, started on special teams last season as a freshman. He was to begin spring practice next week as a starter at outside linebacker.

AUSTIN, Texas - Texas defensive end Cole Pittman was found dead at the scene of a one-car accident.

State troopers discovered Pittman's pickup truck on the side of U.S. Route 79 nearly Easterly, about 100 miles northeast of Austin.

Pittman, a sophomore who had played in 23 games in his two seasons at Texas, was returning to school from his family's home in Shreveport, La.

ATLANTA — Ray Lewis was sued for \$10 million in a wrongful death case stemming from a slaying outside an Atlanta nightclub 13 months ago.

Lewis, the Super Bowl MVP for the Baltimore Ravens, was charged with murdering Richard Lollar and Jacinth Baker after the fatal Jan. 31 street fight that erupted after a post-Super Bowl party. However, the charge was dropped during a four-week trial last spring and Lewis pleaded guilty to misdemeanor obstruction of justice.

HOCKEY

TORONTO — Toronto Maple Leafs defenseman Bryan Berard has given up on returning to the NHL following a severe eye injury.

USA Today reported on its Web site that Berard is unable to see anything beyond shapes in his injured eye and could not make the league's minimum vision requirement.

Berard was injured last March 11 when Marian Hossa's stick hit him in the right eye during Toronto's game against Ottawa. Berard's vision was damaged to the point where a comeback seemed extremely unlikely, but he continued to practice with the hope of returning to the NHL.
