# Hospital beats red ink for a month

## Medical center reports record income in January, making for a small profit

Goodland Regional Medical Center reported record income of nearly \$1 million for January, producing a small profit and leading board members to hope that the big red figures are behind

Management team leader Andy Laue told the board the gross patient revenue of \$988,148 in January was the largest he could remember since he has been in Goodland.

"It is the closest to \$1 million we have ever been, that I know of," Laue said at a board meet-

ing Monday. "It also means the expenses were higher, too, but we did manage to show a small profit of \$6,795."

The profit, said Laue, the hospital's financial director, came mostly because of the revenue from the special county health tax, which brings the hospital a little under \$400,000 a year.

"I take the amount from the county and put one- on the hospital operations. twelfth in each month as part of the other income,"

On the financial reports, hospital operations lost \$30,433 in January, but after adding in investment income of \$1,832 and other income of \$35,228, the net income was \$6,795. The county revenue is over \$30,000 each month, and Laue said the goal is to at least break even

"In today's system we are seeking to break


changes in the various programs to actually make a profit."

Over the past year, Congressman Jerry Moran and others worked on a federal bill to reverse some of the budget cuts which hit rural hospitals These helped balance the federal budget, but caused some hospitals to close and put others in a tight financial bind.

A relief bill was passed by Congress and signed by President Clinton. Laue said the Kansas Hos-

## **Bush** selling budget

## Plan would spend trillions on tax cut

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Bush, vowing to tame the "explosive growth" of government, sent Congress a \$1.96 trillion budget today that would curtail spending in programs ranging from farm aid to transportation while using ballooning surpluses to provide Americans with a \$1.6 trillion tax cut over 10 years.

Bush, who embarked on a two-day road trip to sell his program, declared in Beaver, Pa., that his budget plan was responsible, a matter of fairness and a battle to brake runaway government spending. "The surplus is your money, it's not

the government's money," he said, earning cheers.

Bush said in his 207-page budget plan, called "A Blueprint for New Beginnings," that the proposal would create a federal government "that is both active to promote opportunity and limited to preserve freedom." The budget provides "reasonable spending increases to meet needs while slowing the recent explosive growth that could threaten future prosperity," he said.

\$1.6 trillion, 10-year tax cut was too generous to the wealthy, saying \$750 billion in tax relief weighted to lower income Americans would be more responsible.

## Advanced voting starts next month

The Goodland Daily News Sherman County residents can vote in advance if they need to for the general election in April.

County Clerk Janet Rumpel said the advance voting will be open at least a week before the election, which would be Tuesday, March 27, or earlier depending on when ballots are received. The election will be Tuesday, April 3.

Rumpel said when she gets the ballots, she checks them for errors before she opens the advance voting.

Races include three positions on the Goodland City Commission, three seats on the Goodland School Board and mayor and three seats on the Kanorado City Council.

Running for the Goodland commission are newcomers John Nichols, incumbents Chuck Lutters and Rick Billinger.

For the Goodland School Board, those who have filed include present board members Dick Short and Mike Campbell, and Ron Schilling, a former board member. Voters will get to pick three of the five.

Mayor Hazel Estes is running for reelection in Kanorado. For the council positions, candidates are Marshall Siruta, Greg Pettibone and Deb Fahey. There is one candidate for each seat, so it's likely they'll all be elected.

To vote in advance, residents need to come to the county clerk's office at the courthouse and sign the poll book. If they are a registered voter, they will be given a ballot to mark. After they are done voting, the ballot is put in a locked

If a voter has moved or changed their Brenda McCants and Dean Blume, and name, then they must register again before they can vote. They will have to fill out an application of registration form and will then be allowed to vote a provisional ballot, Rumpel said, which may or may not be counted.

If a voter is not registered, but wants to vote in this election, they may do so if they are a U.S. citizen who is 18 or older. Voters may get a registration form at either the city office or the courthouse. The forms must then be filled out and signed. Registration closes 14 days prior to every election, at 5 p.m. on Monday, March 19.

The county clerk's office is open from 8 a.m. to noon and from 1 to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday. The city clerk's office is open from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday.
