The proposed ordinance was voted down 3-2, and the police department and Warren were asked to meet and try to determine what Warren's interpretation of the present code is.

The commissioners approved a bid from the Hays branch of Shears APAC-Kansas Inc., for \$294,054 to replace bricks on Main at the intersections of Sixth, Seventh and Eighth streets.

The branch, formerly known as Allied, has done work in Goodland before. The bid is contingent on approval by the Kansas Department of Transportation since it is a grant project. The state will pay 70 percent of the cost and the city will pay 30 percent.

Pickman said the city has \$120,000 set aside in its budget for its share. The project wouldn't start until June and would be completed in 90 working days.

The commission opened six bids Friday on a 105 horsepower tractor for the sewer treatment division. The city has \$44,662 in the budget for the tractor, purchase with trade-in. The bid from Goodland Greenline for \$43,000 was accepted.

A change order was approved on the water park project at Steever Park. Pickman said Associated Pool Builders of Bismarck, N.D., wanted to eliminate the ceramic tiles at zero depth entry and walk-in step area and instead use epoxy paint on the surfaces. This will decrease the contract amount by \$3,312, which would make the total \$1,284,388.

Commissioners approved a motion to vacate alley rights-of-way behind the high school and Max Jones Fieldhouse at the request of the Goodland School District. The city will maintain the easements.

Pickman said the city had received four bids for demolition of 316 W. 11th. but only three were accepted because one came in after the deadline. The job was given to Rhoads Construction of Goodland for \$6,400, to be completed by March 30.

The commissioners approved a contract with Sunflower Electric Power Corp. for 4 megawatts of power. Pickman said he and Ed Wolak, public works director, had gone over the market schedules and that this is the best for now. The contract still has to be approved by the Sunflower board.
