"The mowing contract cost the county \$142,276 last the first mowing was completed by the provision for not mowing after 9 year, based on 5,928 miles mowed at middle of August. Schrader said he had the first mowing done by the first week of September.

"When is the most important time to get the weeds mowed?" Frankenfeld asked.

"The first priority is to get the line of sight opened at the intersections and the second is for snow removal." Way said. "If the weeds are not mowed properly in the fall it makes snow removal more of a problem."

Part of the discussion centered around trying to get the weeds mowed the second time before they grow very high, and Way was asked if the county could handle the mowing.

Way said the county used to do the mowing with a man in each road district being tasked with this job, but he said then the road maintenance suffers. "I get the job done," Lucas said.

Lucas said he plans the mowing by doing a quarter of the county at a time, and has used three mowers.

Schrader said he used three mowers last year, but was planning to use five mowers this year to get both sides of the county going at the same time.

The question was raised about spraying more of the 1,200 miles of county roads to reduce the weeds and the need for mowing. Several areas were sprayed last year with this in mind and there were some favorable results. Way said, adding the expense might be higher.

The commissioners decided to table the contract discussion until 8:30 a.m. on March 13, and asked Way to get some cost figures together about having the county do some of the mowing as well as possibly spraying more roads

Charles Andrew Williams, 15, was scheduled to be arraigned on murder and other charges Wednesday afternoon in San Diego.

Three students who might have known about Williams' alleged plans were kept out of classes while district officials investigate, Ward said.

Among them is Vanessa Willis, a 15year-old neighbor of Williams who heard his threats to start a shooting spree but thought they were a joke.

She said she didn't care if students were upset that she has spoken up about classmates teasing Williams. "I feel bad for everyone that was hurt and everything, but they want to be mad at

"We're just keeping it in our radar," said Warren Williams, assistant district superintendent. "Just like students at Columbine, we're affected by what happened here. We're keeping lowlevel tabs on it.'

Still, some students had already heard the news, 15-year-old student Cory Martinez said.

"It's crazy," he said. "It's scary to go to school, but I can't say I feel safe anywhere right now."

Few signs remain of the deadly gunfire that erupted two days ago.

Bullet holes that riddled a bathroom where the massacre began have been patched and covered with paint, and all traces of blood have been scrubbed from the floors.

"I want to talk to a lot of friends that I haven't talked to because I'm worried. A lot of my friends saw everything, and they are pretty upset anyone," his best friend, 16-year-old about it," said freshman Ashley Hart, 14. "I'm not afraid. I'm fine. What upsets me is when my friends are crying."
