Traffic stops on I-70 yield over \$800,000

The Colby Free Press COLBY — A Thomas County Sheriff's deputy stopped a rental vehicle on a routine traffic violation Wednesday and found more than \$426,000 in cash inside.

In all, \$830,000 in cash was pulled off Interstate 70 this week in two incidents—one near Hays, one near Colby — and in both cases, the drivers said they had no knowledge of the money.

The driver stopped in Colby was a man in his late 30s, Sheriff Tom Jones said. In a search of the vehicle, the deputy found the money, all U.S. currency, in three cardboard boxes inside a black suitcase.

"He made no claim to the money," Jones said. "At this point, the money will be recounted and deposited in a drug forfeiture account pending forfei-

ture proceedings." Once a firm amount has been established, paperwork will be forwarded to Thomas County Attorney Alan Taylor for the forfeiture proceedings, Jones
