Lincoln Larks Club

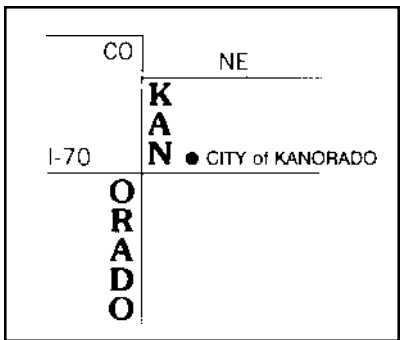
The Lincoln Larks Family and Community Education Club learned about irradiation and genetic engineering of food at their February meeting.
