The U.S. Department of Agriculture has announced details for the Honey Nonrecourse Marketing Assistance Loan and Loan Deficiency Payment Program on the 2000 honey crop.

Dennis Mote, manager of the Sherman County Farm Service Agency, said the assistance loan rate is 65 cents per pound for eligible honey, but there is a loan service fee, which is the smaller of .005 times the gross loan amount or \$45 per loan, plus \$3 for each additional lot.
