First half dooms KU

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — If this the cavernous Alamo Dome. wasn't the ugliest 10-minute stretch of foot on Kansas' fertile soil, it'll do until the ugliest comes along.

Kansas was ahead 4-0 73 seconds into their Midwest semifinal match against Illinois on Friday night. Then everybody began frantically pounding on the button that said, "To self-destruct, push here."

In the next 10 minutes the rattled Jayhawks had 13 turnovers. For six minutes, they didn't even put up a shot. Not a single shot in what finally ended in an 80-64 Illinois victory in the semifinals of the Midwest Regional.

It was the most lopsided defeat any Williams team has endured in the NCAA tournament and one that left him red-eyed.

"I am obviously very disappointed," Williams said.

Illinois was more physical. Their guards were quicker, especially on the defensive perimeter. Kansas point guard Kirk Hinrich had 2 1/2 times as many turnovers (five) as assists (two). Shooting guard Jeff Boschee had a terrible time trying to get an open look, and wound up hitting just 1-of-7.

But perhaps most telling was the depth the region's No. 1 seed kept throwing at the No. 4. They so badly outnumbered the only Big 12 team that was still standing in the tournament it hardly seemed fair.

Three of the Illinois players fouled out. But it didn't seem to matter because they kept rotating big bodies in and out, hacking and banging, banging and hacking.

When their own people got into foul trouble, the thinner Jayhawks were forced to pull up and become tentative.

If the Illini had been able to take advantage, it would have been an embarrassing rout. But they hit only 5-of-20 themselves in those first 10 minutes in

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"This has been a good group to be basketball since Roy Williams first set involved with since day one," said Williams. "Right now, I think we have to congratulate Illinois for the game they played. We turned the ball over too much and their physical size made us play less than a perfect game to say the least."

The Kansas team that outrebounded Syracuse by 33 in their second-round his college career — 0-of-0 from the victory the week before got outrebounded by the Illini 45-30.

But as frustrating as anything was the Jayhawks' futility at the line. Had they been able to convert foul shots, they might have thwarted the Illini's plan to mug anybody in a Kansas uniform who looked like he might have an open shot.

But they missed 17 of 35 from the line

Williams was as baffled as anyone. "I really don't have an explanation," he said. "Even as ugly as we played that

would have helped us, to say the least." Nick Collison led the Jayhawks with 23 points. Yet, at a critical time late in

the game when Kansas was threatening to erase the lead, he missed five foul shots in a row. "Yeah, I was frustrated," he said.

"You want to make them. I tried to make them all. It just wasn't falling through."

"It was extremely frustrating," said

Boschee. "It seemed like every time I'd turn around and catch the ball, somebody was in my lap. In the second half, we cut it to six. But we couldn't finish it off. I don't think we played our best basketball.

"They have to be the toughest defensive team we've faced all year."

Perhaps most striking was the way 7-foot-1 center Eric Chenowith ended floor, 0-of-2 from the line, with two rebounds in 22 minutes of play.

"I'm just empty," he said. "I'm just thinking about all the good times I've had, about my first game and my last game. I had some fun playing here."

As poorly as they played, the Jayhawks were still within striking distance when Collison's 3-pointer cut the lead to just 70-64 with 1:24 to go. But then Illinois outscored them 10-0 the rest of the way.



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
