date, one that meets the demands for success outside of high school. We need to have a vision for our district, and this vision must create an environment that will ensure all students the opportunity to attain their maximum potential. One of my concerns for our school is finance.

"Without a school, our community would suffer. I will strive for responsible spending. A positive interaction between the community and the school is important. I will strive for this positive interaction among the students, faculty, administration and the community. It is the board of education's responsibility to assure this happens. I look forward to working with other board members to achieve these goals, and others."

Tony M. Horinek, and wife Anita have two children — Clint, 18 and Aaron, 13. Clint will graduate this year and Aaron will be an 8th grader. The Horineks have hosted three foreign exchange students and have been foster parents for children over the past several years.

Horinek grew up in Page City, graduating from Triplains High

School in Winona. He continued his education at Colby Community College, earning a degree in agribusiness. He is a lifetime area resident, having worked for the U.S. Soil Conservation Service as a field technician for 10 years, and is involved in operating a dryland farm.

He has served on various boards, including Sacred Heart School Council, Sacred Heart Catholic Church Parish Council and the Program Development Committee for the Thomas County Extension Service. He is currently on the Thomas County Farm Bureau board and the Kansas Farm Bureau Natural Environment Resource Committee.

"I am running for the school board position mainly due to encouragement from others," he said. "I feel we have a strong school system and community. I want students, parents, faculty, staff, administration and board members to be able to communicate openly and honestly. I like to make informed decisions, which means I investigate both sides of the story. I make decisions by seeking out the facts, not relying on hearsay."

Shane Benham, 38, a registered nurse with a bachelor's degree in ani-

mal science, said she really doesn't have an agenda if elected to the Brewster School Board. Shane and her husband have two boys, Joe, 12 and Jacob, 2. One of the reasons she believes people encouraged her to seek the school position was because of her children's ages.

"We have one in junior high and one coming through," she said, "which would mean that we would be involved in almost all areas to know what's going on within the district."

"I don't have an exact agenda of this and this. I certainly want to gather up as much information and knowledge as possible to make wise decisions, which is not to say that the current board has made mistakes."

Benham said she just wants to make the best decisions, along with the rest of the board, to make sure that all of Brewster's children get a quality education.

Carrie Starns, 37, and husband Jon together have five children — Travis 23, Eric 22, Miranda 15, Andrew 12 and Baylee 10. She said she has been an elementary teacher for about 14 years. She has a bachelor's degree in elementary education from the University of Northern Colorado, and a

master's in educational administration from Fort Hays State University. Starns is currently on her fourth year of teaching Head Start pre-school in Goodland and is a member of several teaching/early childhood organizations. She said she truly enjoys her profession.

"I am running for the Brewster School Board because I believe that my background and education will be an asset," she said. "I believe that this is an opportunity for me to use my knowledge, beliefs and principles to make the Brewster School District a better educational facility in all aspects."

Roy E. Dixon is a single parent with three sons — Travis, a senior, Tyson, a sophomore and Trent, a 7th grader. Dixon worked in economic development with the Garden City Chamber of Commerce and Kearny County economic development. He was a substitute teacher at all levels and a minister in the Kansas West Conference of the United Methodist Church. Dixon is active in cattle and quarter horse associations in Kansas, Colorado and the region.

"I am running to be a part of our youths educational development, to listen to concerns and ideas of our students, teachers and community," he said. "We need to be able to have more open communication with parents, teachers, students and community. I would like to see a place where teachers want to be here for years, continue to provide a high quality of education for our students and increase community involvement in the education process."

City Commission to apply for state grant

The Goodland City Commission will discuss applying for a state grant to build a park at Cherry Street and Business U.S. 24, where the road will be rebuilt this summer, when it meets Monday.

Pickman said the chances of the city receiving the state money are slim, as it's a competitive grant and another Goodland group, which plans to renovate an old house in town, has applied.

The city has enough money to pay for half of Pioneer Park's proposed features, but needs about \$300,000 more. A citizen group has formed to help raise money, and City Manager Ron Pickman has said the city plans to apply for a state tourism and attraction grant.

Plans for Pioneer Park include ponds, trees, a walking trail, fountain, bridge and security fence.

The council will also:

- Discuss bids for a trencher for the electric department.
- Hear reports from Pickman, Mayor Chuck Lutters and the commissioners.
