His wife Judy said Monday morning that the first call came on Sunday evening from a *Topeka Capital* Journal reporter who wouldn't say how the newspaper had gotten her son's name. People had been asked to pray for Jeff during Sunday church services, Mrs. Vignery said, and someone from Goodland may have called the newspaper.

"I wish now I hadn't talked to them," she said. "You're so upset anyway that you don't think about it."

Ron Vignery said Jeff's sister Jessica, a junior at Goodland High School, has not been approached by reporters, but other relatives have. He said Jeff, 27, has an older sister Jennifer, 30, and a younger brother, good feeling."

Ron Vignery, a former Navy lawyer, said Jeff's commanding officer called from Whidbey Island, Wash., on Monday night, asking if the family wanted a Naval officer to come to Goodland. ## Chinese won't say whether they boarded plane

blamed on the American plane. The pilot of the Chinese fighter parachuted out and remains missing.

Zhu refused to say whether Chinese officials had boarded the plane, which is packed with hi-tech surveillance equipment. But he dismissed U.S. claims that the plane is sovereign American territory and therefore cannot be boarded.

"If this plane is sovereign American territory, how did it land in China?" Foreign Ministry spokesman Zhu said. "There's no question of immunity at all. Therefore China has all rights to handle this case."

Zhu said China has a right to conduct "an investigation" into the collision.

Zhu said Washington should "admit its mistakes" and "make an explanation to the Chinese government and people on this incident instead of raising this or that demand or try to shirk its responsibilities."
