Mobile home park to re-open

HUTCHINSON (AP) — The Big Chief Mobile Home Park, closed since January's natural gas explosion that claimed two lives, will re-open on Fri-

Owner Robert Kinder says the facility will now be a recreational vehicle and senior citizens mobile home park for people 55 and older. Those who have mobile homes in the park will be 'grandfathered in," allowing them to stay even if they don't meet the age restrictions.

The facility has been closed since the Jan. 18 explosion that fatally injured John and Mary Ann Hahn. That explosion came a day after another one that destroyed two business in downtown Hutchinson

The explosions were traced to natural gas that leaked from a storage field seven miles from Hutchinson and made its way under the ground to the city. The leak caused gas geysers to erupt around Hutchinson.

On Tuesday, Hutchinson police continued to provide security at the mobile home park and Kansas Gas Service vehicles also could be seen on the premises.

"They may be doing a leak survey," said Kansas Gas Service spokesman Conrad Koehler.
