Princess of Japan could give birth to first heir in 30 years

TOKYO — Japan reacted with joy today as the palace announced that Crown Princess Masako appears to be pregnant. If she gives birth to a boy, he would be the first potential heir to the ancient Chrysanthemum Throne born in more than 30 years.

Palace officials made the announcement in a brief news conference. They offered little further information other than to say the 37-year-old princess is "showing signs" that she is pregnant.

Masako, a graduate of Harvard University and a former diplomat in Japan's Foreign Ministry, wed Crown Prince Naruhito in 1993. She suffered a miscarriage in December 1999, weeks after newspaper reports that she was pregnant touched off a media frenzy about the possibility of Japan finally having a new heir to the throne.

Palace officials were criticized then for announcing the pregnancy too early. Reflecting their extreme caution this time, officials said today that a more formal announcement would not be made until there was absolutely no doubt.

Last week, Garrett indefinitely delayed the trial of Bobby Frank Cherry, who was indicted last year but found to be mentally incompetent to stand trial. Herman Cash, the fourth Klan suspect, died in 1994. He was never charged.






