



Third homer wins in 10th

DENVER (AP) — As the ball screamed toward the left-field fence, Todd Hollandsworth sprinted out of the batter's box, figuring he would end up at second with a wall-denting double. Seconds later, Hollandsworth slowed to a jog after yet another reminder of the advantages of hitting in Colorado.

"It was a Coors Field homer," he said. "I hit it hard, but I didn't hit it very high. It just carried out of here."

The opposite-field home run against Arizona right-hander Curt Schilling was the first of three for Hollandsworth on Sunday. He added a go-ahead homer in the eighth and a game-ending three-run shot in the 10th to give the Colorado Rockies a 10-7 victory over the Diamondbacks.

Hollandsworth finished 3-for-5 with a career-high seven RBIs in his first career three-homer game and his fourth multihomer contest. Toronto's Carlos Delgado and Pittsburgh's Aramis Ramirez also have hit three homers in a game this season.

Like Ramirez, Hollandsworth's homers came in successive at-bats and followed some early season inconsistency. "He clicked late last year and was

hoping to start right from there," Rockies hitting coach Clint Hurdle said. "It didn't happen that way, and hopefully he can take some confidence from today. Nothing breeds confidence like success."

Hollandsworth, traded from Los Angeles to Colorado last July, had given the Rockies a 7-5 lead on a two-run homer in the second deck in right field in the eighth, but Erubiel Durazo tied the game with a two-run pinch homer off Jose Jimenez in the ninth.

Ron Gant started 10th with a single to right off Troy Brohawn (0-1) and moved to second on a sacrifice by Todd Walker. After an intentional walk to Todd Helton, Matt Mantei came in to pitch to the right-handed Jeff Cirillo, who struck out following a wild pitch.

Hollandsworth then hit a 97 mph fastball into the Rockies bullpen in right-center field, saving Colorado from having to go any further without any remaining position players on the bench.

"I almost didn't have enough," manager Buddy Bell said. "Holly helped us out. Without him we wouldn't have won it."

Mantei, whose career ERA at Coors Field is 15.26, made no excuses.

"I was brought out there to get us out of that inning, and I didn't get it done," he said. "It happens. He beat me with my best pitch. It wasn't a bad pitch, either."

Nine of Colorado's runs came on homers, giving Arizona's broadcaster-turned-manager Bob Brenly an aggravating first taste of Coors Field. A two-run homer by Cirillo turned out to be the difference in Colorado's victory on Saturday.

"It really doesn't matter what my opinion is, because this is where they play," Brenly said. "There's very little foul territory. The infield grass is fast as a pool table. The ball flies forever. There's very little leeway for a pitcher. There is no big part of the park here."

Horacio Estrada (1-1) pitched a perfect 10th for the win as the Rockies handed Arizona its eighth loss in 10 games. The Diamondbacks (4-8), predicted to contend for a division title, are in last place in the NL West.

"One of the advantages of being a veteran team is this doesn't get you down so much as it gets you angry," Schilling said. "It's not that the breaks aren't going our way or bad hops. We're just not playing well enough to win."

Cowgirls take fourth

The Goodland High School took fourth place at the K.T. Woodman Track Classic at Wichita State University earlier this month.

The girls had 46 points, just one point away from second place, while the boys gained some experience on their way to a 22nd-place finish at the meet April 6.

The girls were led by their sprinters and relay teams. Cody Pettibone placed second in both the 100m dash and the 200m dash while Lacey Brenner finished third in the 400m dash. The 4x100m relay team took first place out of the 21 schools present and

the 4x400m team placed second. For the boys, Bryan Mai placed fifth in the 300m hurdles.

Goodland's next meet will be at 9:30 a.m. Tuesday at Scott City.

Avs play third game in series in Vancouver

VANCOUVER, British Columbia (AP) — The Vancouver Canucks have no plans to roll out a welcome mat for Colorado Avalanche defenseman Ray Bourque.

The Avalanche upgraded Bourque's status to probable for Game 3 of their Western Conference quarterfinal series in Vancouver on Monday night. Colorado beat Vancouver 2-1 in Game 2 on Saturday night and leads the best-of-seven series 2-0.

"We know he's going to be a future

Hall of Famer, but we're not going to give him any accolades," Vancouver coach Marc Crawford said. "We're going to make life tough on him and we're going to continue to challenge their defense."

Bourque missed the first two games of the series because of lower back pain. He skated in a 35-minute workout Sunday before the team left for Vancouver.

Bourque listed himself as a game-time decision.

"Raymond felt real good this morning and took part in the entire practice," Colorado coach Bob Hartley said. "I talked to him a little bit, and he feels it is very probable that he will be in the lineup tomorrow. That is good news."

Crawford said Bourque's return might be an advantage for the Canucks.

"He's a world class player and he gives them another weapon, but it could be an advantage for us because he hasn't played yet in an intense series," Crawford said.
