## Israel denies pullout of Gaza Strip was due to U.S. pressure

today completed a pullout from a Palestinian-controlled slice of the Gaza Strip it had seized just a day earlier, but denied the about-face was a result of heavy U.S. pressure.

Shortly after the Israelis left, Palestinians fired six mortar shells at a Jewish settlement and an army post in Gaza, causing no injuries. Israel's brief takeover of a square mile of land in Gaza had been triggered by mortar fire on an Israeli town.
