BEIJING — China has detained an American writer and former teacher, the U.S. embassy said today, the fifth Chinese-born intellectual with foreign ties to be held in a sweeping anti-espionage campaign.

Wu Jianmin, a U.S. citizen, was detained April 8 and is suspected of espionage, the U.S. Embassy here said. Police informed embassy officials of Wu's detention on April 14, saying he was under investigation for spying on behalf of Taiwan.

DAVENPORT. Iowa—High school students piled off buses and onto the riverfront sandbag lines as the rising Mississippi lapped 5 feet from the top of a temporary levy.

The river isn't expected to crest until next week in Davenport — the only major city on the upper Mississippi without permanent flood control structures — but forecasters say it could rise another  $4 \frac{1}{2}$  feet before then.
