Kansas election laws change

TOPEKA (AP) — The first of several small revisions in Kansas' election laws take effect this week, and Secretary of State Ron Thornburgh said Monday he was pleased the state's procedures needed only minor tweaking.

Gov. Bill Graves has signed several bills on elections, including measures to make requesting recounts easier for some candidates, to clean up voter registration rolls and to expand laws on election-related crimes.

Kansas did not need the kind of overhaul many states were moved to consider by the vote-counting chaos that gripped Florida after last November's presidential election, Thornburgh said. "The one thing to remember about the situation in Florida is that we are not
