Judge rules on Chiefs player's estate

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) — A judge dealing with the estate of Derrick Thomas has ruled the late football star was the father of four children besides three others for whom his paternity already had been established.
Thomas, a linebacker for the Kansas City Chiefs, died last year of complications after being injured in a traffic accident that left him partially paralyzed. Thomas, who was not married, had no will, and his heirs are being determined by the Jackson County probate court.
At a hearing Monday, attorneys for

the Thomas estate challenged the paternity of four of the children, two living in Florida and two others in Kansas City. The two mothers of those four children testified that Thomas readily accepted the children, supported them financially and treated them as family.
Judge John A. Borron Jr. made his ruling almost immediately after testimony by a parade of witnesses.
"I'm very relieved," said Terrye Jenkins, who lives in the Kansas City area. "I knew that was my kids' father."
Even Edith Morgan, Thomas' mother and a representative of the estate,

testified Thomas supported them "all their lives." Tom Collins, an attorney representing the estate, said he was simply trying to ensure that only Thomas' biological children are his heirs.
The paternity of three of the children, by three different mothers, had previously been determined through legal means and DNA testing. Attorneys for the two mothers involved in Monday's hearing had argued DNA testing wasn't required by law, and Borron agreed.
"There was no reason for DNA testing," attorney Berry Laws said. "It was

an absolute insult to tell those kids to validate their existence."
Among witnesses called by attorneys for the two mothers were the beneficiaries manager for the Chiefs, the president of Thomas' charitable foundation and a swim coach for one of the children. Through those and other witnesses, the attorneys reconstructed much of the children's lives and their association with Thomas, presenting as evidence everything from birth certificates to income tax forms to photos depicting family trips involving all seven kids.

Major League pitcher of '40s-'50s dies at 82

UTICA, N.Y. (AP) — Harold "Hal" White, who pitched for the Detroit Tigers and the St. Louis Browns and Cardinals, has died at 82.
White, a native of Utica, N.Y., died Saturday at a hospital in Venice, Fla., after a stroke while being catheterized, his wife, Lenore, said Monday.
"It's a shock," she said. "You just don't believe these things are happening."

White broke into the majors with the Detroit Tigers in 1941, after a stellar 1940 season with the International League's Buffalo Bisons, where he compiled a 16-4 record.
In 1942, he had his best year, going 12-12 with a 2.91 ERA. He pitched 336 games in all, most of them with the Tigers, ending with a 46-54 record.
White missed two seasons — one in 1945 when the Tigers won the World

Series — to serve in the military during World War II.
White went to the St. Louis Browns in 1953 and finished his career with the St. Louis Cardinals in 1954.
He was one of only five major league pitchers to throw shutout wins in his first two starts.
After he retired, he turned to coaching, scouting and managing. In 1975, he managed the Batavia Trojans of the

New York-Penn League.
White was one of 90 old-timers who attended the closing of Tiger Stadium two years ago.
"He cried his tears when they folded up the flag for the last time," Lenore White said.
His funeral is Tuesday in Venice, and he will be buried at a national veterans' cemetery in Bushnell, Fla.

New York Knicks player apologizes to team and fans

NEW YORK — Charlie Ward apologized to his team, the NBA and New York Knicks fans after commissioner David Stern condemned Ward's religious "zealotry."
Ward was booed at Madison Square Garden on Sunday for statements he made about Jews in a New York Times Magazine story. Ward, who claimed his statements were taken out of context, described Jews as stubborn and said they persecute Christians every

day.
"I want to truly apologize to everybody who was offended by the New York Times Magazine story. I will say again that I would never condemn or criticize any group or religion. That is not who I am," Ward said.
SOUTH WINDSOR, Conn. — A knife-wielding man took Marcus Camby's mother and two sisters hostage before surrendering peacefully.
Troy Crooms was charged with burglary, first-degree sexual assault, kid-

napping, assault, unlawful restraint and possession of a weapon following the nearly eight-hour standoff. Bail was set at \$500,000 and he was scheduled for arraignment Tuesday.
Police said the 28-year-old Hartford man was known to the New York Knicks star's family. The mother had

called police earlier this month about a dispute at the home, and police questioned Crooms and one of Camby's sisters at the time, but did not file any charges, South Windsor police spokesman Sgt. Matthew Reed said.
Camby's 21-year-old sister had a knife held to her throat.
