Students learn from workshops

Third through sixth grade students in Goodland learned about buffaloes, buffalohunters, electricity, computers, math skills, the Civil War, building dams and ambulances and their equipment at a seminar in early April.

"Jump Start Your Mind," a seminar which offered various workshops, was sponsored by the Goodland American Association of University Women and held from 6:45 to 8:30 p.m. on April 10 at North School.

The women's association has sponsored the seminar annually since 1993. For several years, the workshops were strictly math and science. But in the last few years, careers have been added as well as history. This year, parents were invited to come with their children.

To encourage all students to attend, the association provided a paraprofessional for hearing impaired or bilingual students when needed.

The format for the workshops has stayed essentially the same through the years. Students got to choose three workshops from the ones offered and each workshop lasted about 25 minutes.

A small fee was charged to pay for expenses. Any leftover money is applied to a scholarship for a girl to go to the Future Astronaut Training Program in Hutchinson.
