Thousands protest Philippine leader's arrest for corruption

MANILA, Philippines — An angry crowd stoned police as they cleared a path to escort ousted President Joseph Estrada from his home in the first arrest of a Philippine leader over corruption. Thousands more protested later today outside his jail cell.

Estrada, who defiantly maintained his innocence and insisted he never gave up the presidency, left home accompanied by his wife — a Senate candidate — and son Jinggoy, also arrested today on plunder charges. The non-bailable offense carries the death penalty, although it is considered unlikely to be imposed.

About 8,000 supporters gathered estinian peace talks, Prime Minister Ariel Sharon says, but Palestinian officials insisted today that any alterations would erase the proposal's meaning.

In an interview published in the The chief anti-graft court, the Jerusalem Post newspaper, Sharon said Israeli Foreign Minister Shimon Peres will go to Cairo to deliver Israel's formal response to the Egyptian-Jordanian proposal. Israeli media reports said Peres would visit Egypt on Friday, but his spokesman, Yoram Dori, said a date for the trip has not been set.

Next week, Peres is to hold talks in "some changes and improvements" in Washington with U.S. Secretary of State Colin Powell.

"It is impossible for us to accept any proposals that would change this initiative," said Palestinian Planning Minister Nabil Shaath, who met Tuesday in Amman with Jordanian Foreign Minister Abdul Ilah Khatib.

The proposal calls for an end to seven months of fighting and an Israeli freeze on settlement construction ahead of a resumption of talks. It also calls for a return to negotiations on a final peace deal, while Sharon only wants to negotiate a long-term interim agreement.
