Vignery fought to keep a Navy surveillance plane from crashing after it was struck by a Chinese fighter, the pilot told a Statehouse news conference today, but said he doesn't consider himself a hero.

Vignery said he and another Navy pilot were at the controls of the EP-3E turboprop when it was struck April 1 over the South China Sea and forced to land on Hainan island.

The 24 crew members were detained 11 days by the Chinese government

"We're not heroes. We were just doing our jobs," he said today. "The real heroes are the American people who supported us.'

During a news conference, Vignery recounted the harrowing minutes after the F-8 fighter buzzed the plane and then collided with it, clipping a propeller and knocking off its nose

cone. The plane plummeted about 7,500 feet in about 45 seconds before the pilots managed to straighten it out. They landed about 20-30 minutes later, he
