New state laws to take effect

TOPEKA(AP)—An inquisitive 18- ease outbreak. year-old, a European animal disease outbreak and the Hoisington tornado all inspired new laws taking effect next week.

Gov. Bill Graves signed into law Thursday a bill requiring school officials who use district credit cards to disclose spending records to local school boards and the public.

It's time to raise mowing heights

We've been able to successfully mow lawns pretty low thus far -2 inches for fescue, 1.5 inches for bluegrass.


Mowing at these

heights is great for early spring because it helps thicken lawns and removes dead growth from the previous season, but now is the time to raise mowing heights back to the maximum end of the scale for our lawn species, 3.5 inches for fescue, 2.5 inches for bluegrass.

This change in early May helps promote the development of roots as we move towards summer, especially if it coincides with the K-State Research and Extension recommended use of fertilizer at this time of year. Remember that mowing height is inversely related to root growth; the higher we mow, the deeper roots can go. Why?


When we suppress vertical growth by mowing, the turf plant responds by producing secondary shoots as an alternate form of growth. These alternates can be tillers or runners (or both), depending on the species. This is why our lawns get thicker in early spring.

While beneficial in spring, this does expend resources as new tissues are being produced. As we move into May,

we want simply to maintain the growth that is there. This avoids nutrient energy from a spring fertilizer application being wasted on unnecessary new leaf growth. Instead, this energy can be sent to the roots for new development and storage
