'Discovery Days' is 4-H learning event

What is 4-H Discovery Days? It is a learning experience for Kansas 4-Hers who are 13 or older that gives them a taste of college life.

4-H members from all over Kansas go to the Kansas State University campus in Manhattan at the end of May for three days of fun. They can take classes they are interested in while they are there. They eat meals in the campus dining hall and stay in the university's dorms.

The 4-Hers learn how to get along with people who they would meet at college. They get to meet college students who are there to help in any way possible. Most of the college floor supervisors are former 4-H members.

This year, Discovery Days will be next week, May 30 through June 1. You can go shopping in the Student Union or in your spare time you can go bowling or play pool or snooker in the basement of the union. They also have an indoor pool where you can swim for a small fee. You can go to the dances the university holds while the 4-Hers are there. You get to meet lots of 4-Hers who are your age. You can learn about different county 4-H activities.

Sign-up for this year's event has passed, but you can get forms for next year in early spring at the Sherman County Extension Office. The cost for attending is \$95. If you would like to purchase a T-shirt with that year's Discovery Days theme on it, the cost is a little extra. The classes you take deter-

mine the total amount you will have to pay. Also, you may need to purchase supplies for some classes.

The classes you sign-up for will either be an all-day class or two half days. Some of the classes I have taken in the two years I have gone were swing dance, waltz and country two-step. They teach you all the neat little tricks they do. Then at the dance you can show off because you know what you are doing.

Craft classes include quilling, which is making a design by rolling up or twisting small strips of paper; leather craft, where you make a wallet or different little pouches with cool designs; scrapbook making, where you bring your own pictures and they help you put a scrapbook together; and puzzle picture frames, where you use old puzzle pieces and make picture frames

out of them. There is also cookie baking, where you make huge cookies which are good to eat on the way home.

They also offer basic canoe and hiking classes. Bird watching in the Flint Hills is an all-day trip that is worth taking. A trip to the zoo with your camera is a good way to get great shots for your 4-H photography project. Touring the historical cities around Manhattan helps you learn some interesting history about Kansas.

They also have different livestock classes such as horseback riding, which will help you become a better rider or showman, or building your own cattle herd using a computer game. They have an all-day fishing class, too, which is a lot of fun if you like fishing. Dana Belshe, Sherman County extension agent, usually goes along to teach this class.

I have learned a lot of cool things while being at Discovery Days. You can make lots of new friends and learn how the 4-H program is working all over Kansas.
