## **Tornadoes** CanKill

Although most tornadoes strike during the spring and summer months, it is important to realize that they can occur anywhere at any time. The winds of the tornado can reach speeds of 300 mph, and at these speeds, neither man nor nature make many things that can hold together. The one thing to remember about tornadoes is that they will go where they want. GET TO SHELTER IMMEDIATELY! With this in mind, the best place to go is underground, or as underground as possible to avoid the winds and flying debris.

### NOAA **Weather Radio**

Broadcasts National Weather Service warnings, watches, forecasts and other hazard information 24 hours a day. These radios may be purchased from most any electronics store. Tune into 162.400MHzinNorthwest Kansas. The hearing and visually impaired also can get these warnings in other ways. People may listen to their favorite AM/FM radio station or TV station.
