

Two Brewster players to be in All-Star game

Clint Horinek and Justin Jamison, both 2001 graduates of Brewster High School, have been selected to the Division II West 8-Man All Star squad.

The game will be played at 10 a.m. Saturday at the Beloit High School Trojan Stadium.

Horinek plans to attend college, play football and major in elementary education and physical education in the fall.

His football honors include being selected All-League first team and All-State Honorable Mention in 1999. In 2000, he rushed for 1,193 yards and 19 touchdowns, 18 two-point conversions; caught 36 passes for 466 yards and 11 touchdowns; and on defense, had 43 tackles, 5 sacks, 5 fumble recoveries and 1 interception.

Brewster was Western Kansas Liberty League Runner-up and regional runner-up in 2000 with a 9-2 record. In 1999, they were Western Kansas Liberty League Runner-up and sub-state runner-up with a 10-2 record.

Horinek has been a member of the Brewster basketball team the past four years. In 1997-98 they were Sage Brush Champions, regional champs, and sub-state champs with a record of 24-2; in 98-99 they were

Sage Brush champs, regional champs, sub-state champs and placed 3rd at state with a 26-1 record; in 2000 he was named All-League Honorable Mention on the Sage Brush championship team that also placed first at state. This season, he was selected to the *Salina Journal* pre-season top 20.

He was selected as a K-18 All Star in the summer of 1998 on the baseball team and was Wendy's Sherman County Star "Athlete of the Week" in baseball, basketball and football. He also participated in power lifting. Tony and Anita Horinek, Brewster are his parents.

Jamison plans to attend Kansas State University in the fall. He was selected to the First Team All League Football in 2000; All-Area Football Selection; and was sixth in State Power lifting (clears). He had 84 tackles, 9 sacks, 1 fumble recovery and 1 interception in 2000. Brewster was league champion in 1998, league champs and sub-state runner up in 1999, and league runner-up and regional runner-up in 2000.

Jamison was a member of the state basketball champion team in 2000 and was selected for the all-area basketball team.

Giants slugger hits 30th, breaks 73 year old record

Barry Bonds' assault on the record books continued Monday night as he hit his 30th home run of the season, reaching the mark faster than anyone in major league history.

Bonds connected in the fourth inning for a solo shot in the San Francisco Giants' 3-1 win over San Diego. The Giants moved to one game under .500 and six back of the Arizona Diamondbacks in the National League West

Bonds hit No. 30 in 57 games. Babe Ruth reached 30 homers in 63 games in 1928, while Mark McGwire, baseball's single season home run king, needed 64 games in 1998 to reach 30. McGwire broke Rodger Maris's 27-year-old single season record of 61 home runs in 1998 when he hit 70. Ruth had held the record with 60. Ken Griffey Jr. took 65 games to reach 30 in 1994 and is fourth on the list. Ruth

rounds out the top five as he hit 30 in 67 games in 1930. Ruth is second on the all-time home run list with 714.

The Giants' left fielder was picked as the NL Player of the Month on Monday after hitting a major league record 17 home runs in May. Bonds broke a record of 16 shared by Mark McGwire (1998) and Mickey Mantle (1956).

Bonds has 524th career homers for 11th on the career list. He needs 10 more to match Jimmie Foxx for 10th.

Bonds, who holds the career mark for most home runs hit by a left-hander in the National League, has homered in 11 of his last 16 games. He is hitting .309 this year with 56 RBIs and 45 runs. Of his 52 hits, more than half are home runs.

His previous season highs in home runs are 49 last season and 43 in 1993, his first season with the Giants.

Royals settle with gunshot victim; bullet injured women last season

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) — The Kansas City Royals have reached a confidential settlement with a woman who was shot during a game at Kauffman Stadium last summer.

Virginia Olsthoorn of Haysville, Kan. was wounded by a single bullet that passed through her left side and lodged in her left elbow. Her lawsuit claimed the Royals should have made sure no one at the game had a gun. The Royals claimed the bullet came from outside the stadium.

Royals vice president of finance Dale Rohr said Monday the case is effectively over, although the paperwork hasn't been finalized. He refused to discuss the terms of the agreement. Olsthoorn had been asking for at least \$25,000.

"We never thought we were at fault," Rohr said. "But we wanted to get the thing settled."

Olsthoorn's attorney, Joseph Borich, didn't immediately return a message from The Associated Press seeking comment.

Olsthoorn recently told The Kansas City Star that "we kind of settled" the case.

She also declined to elaborate on financial details, but said she's recovered rather well from the injury.

"Sometimes, my elbow gets kind of sore," she said. "But I think I'll live."

Olsthoorn has not yet returned to Kauffman Stadium. Asked if she ever will, she sighed and paused.

"Oh," she said, "probably one of these days."

Avs pushed to brink

DENVER (AP) — Ray Bourque's black cap hung from its hook, momentarily abandoned by its owner.

Instead, Bourque wore a suit and a somber look. Make no mistake, "Mission 16W" is in jeopardy.

Bourque's career-long pursuit of the Stanley Cup is in danger of being discarded along the New Jersey Turnpike after the defending champion Devils beat the Colorado Avalanche 4-1 in Game 5 of the finals Monday night.

The victory gave the Devils a 3-2 series lead heading back to the Meadowlands for Game 6 on Thursday. New Jersey's arena is located off Exit 16W, a sign that could prove haunting for Bourque if Colorado loses its third straight game.

Mission 16W — the number of playoff victories needed to win the title — has been Bourque's mantra for the past eight weeks.

"In my case, every game is a new life for us, and you try to make the adjustments," Bourque said. "We're down 3-2, but it's a long way from being over. We have every intention of bringing it back to Denver for Game 7. There's no time to be frustrated. ... I've got plenty of juice left, believe me."

Bourque, a 40-year-old defenseman in his 22nd season, gave Colorado life in the first period Monday night with a play that threatened to deflate the Devils.

With the Avalanche trailing 1-0, he blocked a centering pass to thwart a 3-on-1 rush, and teammate Alex Tanguay tied the game on the ensuing 2-on-1

chance.

The play was reminiscent of Game 2 of the Western Conference semifinals when Bourque batted a puck out of midair before it crossed the goal line, setting up the go-ahead score seconds later.

That was against the Los Angeles Kings. These are the New Jersey Devils. Big difference.

Instead of wilting after the shift in momentum, the Devils played even better as they took advantage of several defensive gambles by Colorado.

Alexander Mogilny's wrist shot during a 3-on-2 break gave New Jersey a 2-1 lead with 1:13 left in the first period. It was his first goal in 15 games and came as the Devils looked for offensive support without injured center Jason Arnott.

"That was definitely the turning point," Devils forward John Madden said. "We felt that if we could get through the first period either tied or up a goal, we would be in good shape."

Sergei Brylin, another Devils player in a scoring slump, scored on a power play 4:39 into the second. The 3-1 New Jersey lead marked the first time in 21 playoff games that the Avalanche faced a two-goal deficit.

The three goals were plenty for Devils goalie Martin Brodeur, who made remarkable saves against Dave Reid, Dan Hinote, Eric Messier and Rob Blake. He finished with 22 saves and moved one step closer to his third Stanley Cup.

"These opportunities don't come

every day," Brodeur said. "We have two cracks at it. I don't think we want to get ourselves into the situation of coming back here, pushing a Game 7 coin that could be tossed and anybody could win."

Besides momentum, New Jersey has the odds in its favor. The winner of Game 5 in a 2-2 series has gone on to win the Cup 13 of 16 times.

Colorado, however, is a defiant group. The NHL's top team during the regular season, the Avs remained confident they will force a seventh game in Denver next Saturday.

They are 6-3 on the road in the playoffs.

"I think we've proven in the past we can do this," coach Bob Hartley said. "We're going to be flying to New Jersey on a mission. It's a big loss, a very disappointing loss, but there's no sense looking back. We know what we have to do in Jersey."

To force Game 7, the Avalanche will need a strong performance from goalie Patrick Roy, who gave up four goals for the second time in 16 games, and fewer mistakes in the neutral zone.

In an attempt to put more pressure on Brodeur, Colorado's defenseman gambled often, leading to 11 odd-man rushes for the Devils.

New Jersey converted three times, setting themselves up for third title in seven seasons.

"The last one is always the hardest one to get," coach Larry Robinson said. "We can't be doing crazy things, because they're an explosive team."

Future hall-of-famer to sign with Raiders

LOS ALTOS, Calif. (AP) — Jerry Rice, who set every significant NFL receiving record during 16 years with the San Francisco 49ers, was released by the team. He soon will sign with the Oakland Raiders, 49ers vice president Bill Walsh said at Rice's charity golf tournament.

But before teeing off at Los Altos Hills Country Club, Rice said he was still deciding between the Raiders and the Seattle Seahawks.

The 38-year-old Rice, who has a record 1,281 receptions and 187 touchdowns, had spent his entire career with the 49ers.

He was cut because of the team's salary cap problems.

Although he lists his team triumphs — three Super Bowl titles and 14 winning seasons — as his greatest achievements, Rice has had an unparalleled career with the 49ers.

Also among his NFL records are his

176 touchdowns on pass receptions; 12 seasons with more than 1,000 yards receiving; 1,848 yards receiving in a single season; and 22 touchdown receptions in a single season.

The 12-time Pro Bowl selection was the NFL Offensive Player of the Year in 1987 and 1993 and the Super Bowl MVP in 1989.

He has 19,247 yards receiving, including at least one catch in his last 225 games, another record.
