Things looking up for hospital

said, in-patient revenue might decrease due to the time of stay limits and a cut-back to 15 acute care beds in the critical access hospital regulations.
"Related expenses would decrease, but not in proportion to revenue due to significant fixed costs," he said.
The hospital would lose its current designation as a sole community hospital by becoming a critical access hospital.
The bright spot, the letter says, may be the Medicare reimbursement would change. Based on the figures from last year, they estimated an increase of \$132,000 in reimbursement to the hospital.
Jolly gave an update on the medical staff, and said that they are trying to set up a joint conference between the hos-

pital board and the doctors.
The board approved purchase of a new piece of equipment for the nursery. Jolly says the device, which cost \$7,804, is used in the delivery room to handle all of a newborn's needs as they come into the world. This replaces an older machine, which will become the backup.
Looking at the financials for April, Jolly said they show a net loss of \$23,109 for the month, and that means a loss for the year of \$54,543. Comparing the figures to the budget, he said the loss is about \$4,000 less than expected and \$170,000 less than the same time last year, when the loss was \$221,585.
"We see an increase in bad debt, which may be part of the slowdown in reimbursements," Jolly said. "We have increased the reserve to 4 percent to cover this."

Jolly said the daily figures indicate May was a busy month, and that the hospital continues to be busy.
The activity indicators for April indicate that the positive trend is continuing, he said, with the average daily census up to about 18, five ahead of last year. Emergency visits dropped a little, from 125 in April 2000 to 112 this year. Outpatient visits were a little ahead of last year at 2,527 compared to 2,503 last year.
The next board meeting will be 6:30 p.m. Monday, June 25, in the conference room.
Jolly said there were requests for emergency medical technician training that were not acted on at the meeting, but the board wants to develop a new policy for handling all such requests. He said this will probably be on the next agenda.

for picking up any of these items, except for tires or appliances with coolant in them, like refrigerators, air conditioners and freezers.
There is a \$6 charge for freon removal and the fee for tire removal is based on size. These fees must be paid

before the city will pickup either of these items. Go to the city office, 204 W. 11th.
To find out the cost for tire removal, call the city solid waste office at 899-4539 or the county transfer station at 899-4868. To schedule any special pickup, call Crutcher at the city solid waste office.

People can take their trash or unwanted items to the transfer station themselves, except for medical waste, household hazardous waste or items such as gas, motor oil and antifreeze. The station, on County Road 67 just east of North Caldwell Avenue, is open from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Saturday and from 1 to 5 p.m. Sunday.
