said, in-patient revenue might decrease due to the time of stay limits and a cutback to 15 acute care beds in the critical access hospital regulations.

"Related expenses would decrease, but not in proportion to revenue due to significant fixed costs," he said.

The hospital would lose its current designation as a sole community hospital by becoming a critical access hospital.
