Gardens. Raises were approved for Kevin Butts and Roger Studer of the sheriff's office due to promotions and completion of probationary period, based on the recommendation of Sheriff Doug Whitson.

Commissioner Chuck Frankenfeld made the motion to approve them and Commissioner Mitch Tiede seconded. The motion passed unanimously with Commissioner Kevin Rasure voting yes.

Ron Ewing, field administrator for the Green Thumb program from St. Francis, talked to the commissioners about the program and ask if the county might be able to use such a worker from the federal program.

Ewing said the program helps people over 55 find jobs to supplement their income. It will help train the person, and once employed, Green Thumb will pay half of the salary for at least six months.

Green Thumb tries to work with businesses that need part-time workers, as they are required to work at least 20 hours per week at minimum wage or more.

"My job is to get the word out so the businesses are aware of the program," Ewing said, "and perhaps hiring people that are wanting part-time work."

The commissioners said they thought the Noxious Weed Department could benefit from a part-time person, and said they would talk with department head Daryl West to see if he is interested.

John Golden, one of Sherman County's representatives on the Mid State Port Authority, who was reappointed at the previous meeting, met with the commissioners to update them on the work of the authority.

County Attorney Bonnie Selby presented a draft letter to the Convention and Visitors Bureau and asked the commissioners to review it and decide

if it should be sent. In the letter, Selby suggests the bureau might look into working with the Sherman County Historical Society as a joint venture to promote tourism. The commissioners approved the letter.

Selby also said she has send letters to at least three entities that continue to use the county's federal identification number instead of applying for a separate number. They had also received letters last year, but the fair board and county fire district are two of those who have not gotten new numbers.

The next regular commissioner meeting is scheduled for 8 a.m. Tuesday, but County Clerk Janet Rumpel said unless something comes up, there will not be a meeting until Tuesday, June 19.

Rumpel said the commissioners are scheduled to meet with the county recycling/solid waste committee and the city commissioners at 5 p.m. Tuesday to hear the committee's recommendations.

Accused bomber files for stay of execution

jected the argument.

The Supreme Court mostly has been unsympathetic to 11th-hour pleas for stays of execution. McVeigh's execution was delayed last month by Attorney General John Ashcroft after the government found some documents hadn't been turned over to the defense, but Ashcroft opposes further delays.

"We've never had a doubt about the guilt of Timothy McVeigh," Ashcroft said Wednesday.

In the 18-page brief filed Thursday, attorney Rob Nigh asked the appeals judges to set aside their emotions while reviewing the arguments and the evidence.

"It is extremely hard not to be improperly influenced by the immense suffering and agony at the heart of this case. Being able to recognize and act upon the elemental demands of fairness in this case requires each of us to summon up the best in us," he wrote.

"We believe ... the district court succumbed to the human tragedy of this case and lost sight of the demands of fairness. We pray that this court not do the same."

He said if attorneys had more time to review the newly released documents, he could show the FBI suppressed credible evidence that other people played a significant role in the bombing and that the jury might have been swayed not to sentence McVeigh to death.

During Wednesday's hearing, Matsch said he was shocked to learn of the newly released material, but he said the jury's verdict should stand.

"Whatever role others may have played, it's clear that Timothy McVeigh committed murder and mayhem as charged," the judge said. "Whatever may in time (be) disclosed about possible involvement of others in this bombing, it will not change the fact that Timothy McVeigh was the instrument of death and destruction."

McVeigh was convicted in 1997 of conspiracy, using a weapon of mass destruction and murdering eight federal law enforcement officers. The April 19, 1995, explosion at the Alfred P. Murrah Federal Building killed 168 people and was considered the deadliest act of terrorism on U.S. soil.

In seeking an execution delay, McVeigh accused the government of committing a "fraud upon the court" for failing to turn over all information before trial as Matsch had ordered. The Justice Department presented the new documents to the defense six days before the original May 16 execution date.

Prosecutor Sean Connelly said the information in the documents was contained in FBI interview reports made available before trial. He noted that McVeigh had confessed to the bombing in a recent book.

In Oklahoma City, Martha Ridley, whose daughter Kathy died in the bombing, said: "I just want to get this thing over with and be done with it."

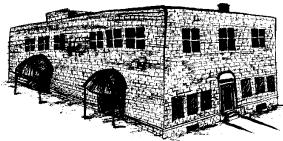

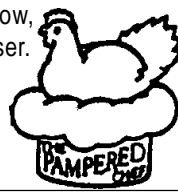

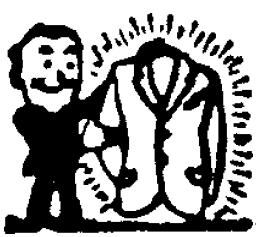
