Memorial Day weekend, though, she rode her bike to Colby on Saturday and over to Burlington on Sunday.

During the week, she's rode about 15 miles either in the morning or evening. Then on Saturdays and Sundays, she's rode to Burlington and back.

The main goal of the biking event is to have fun, get some exercise and enjoy the beauty of Kansas, organizers say.

"I just go and enjoy the sights and sounds," Estes said. "It's fun. You just really meet up with some neat people."

She said it's not a race and she goes at her own pace.

Estes plans to start out around 6 or 6:30 a.m. each morning, as she has in past years.

"I try to get up and ride when it's as cool as possible," she said.

She usually arrives at each day's destination about mid-afternoon.

There are medics and mechanics available for the bicyclists, Estes said, but she hasn't had any health or bike problems in the past.

She said some people who are younger than she is have had heat strokes on the trip, but she's never had leg cramps or even a blister.

Estes said she gets her bike serviced before she goes and has the repairman put stop-leak in the tires.

The humidity doesn't bother her, she said. Most of the gyms are air conditioned and there is plenty of air as you

She said the bicyclists are to check in and out at each town so that organizers will know if someone doesn't show up

She said the first year she went on the ride, it was overwhelming when she walked into a gym full of people and wondered where she would sleep.

"But pretty soon," she said, "you just throw out your bedroll."
